

Basic Guidelines

for Inspecting Honey Bee Hives and Prescribing Antibiotics as a Veterinarian

- 1. A veterinarian needs to establish a veterinary client relationship (i.e. visit the apiary in person) before they can write a prescription for an antibiotic. It is NOT okay for a veterinarian to write a prescription without a prior relationship to the client.
 - **a.** However, the veterinarian does not need to visit the hive every time. In order to establish a relationship, the veterinarian needs to visit the apiary at least once a year. After the initial visit, the beekeeper can call or email the vet with questions.
- 2. In a commercial apiary (>250 colonies), a veterinarian should inspect at least 10% of hives.
- 3. Veterinarians need to report all observed diseases to the Massachusetts Department of Agriculture Apiary Team (bees@mass.gov).
